The prize recognises academic excellence in LAWS 324 *Principles of Public International Law* in Te Kaupeka Ture | Faculty of Law at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

1. The prize is a monetary award at a value of \$1000.

**Ewart Hay Prize in Public International** 

- 2. One prize is available annually to students who, in the year of the award, completed the course LAWS 324 *Principles of Public International Law* and were enrolled in a programme for an LLB degree at the University.
- 3. The prize is awarded by Te Kaunihera | Council of the University on the recommendation of the Amo Matua | Executive Dean of Law (or nominee).
- 4. In making the recommendation, the Amo Matua | Executive Dean of Law (or nominee) considers academic achievement in LAWS 324 *Principles of Public International Law* in the year of the award.
- 5. If, in any year, there is more than one candidate deemed worthy of the award, the prize is offered to each, with the value to be divided equally among them.
- 6. If, in any year, there is no candidate of sufficient merit, no prize is offered.
- 7. The prize is paid by direct credit to a recipient's nominated New Zealand bank account.
- 8. A condition of acceptance is that a recipient permits the announcement and publication of acceptance of the award.

Whakamahuki | Background information: Christine Brownlie established this prize in 2009 in memory of her uncle, the late Ewart Hay. Ewart Hay was a graduate in Law from Canterbury College, the forerunner of Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury. Ewart Hay undertook his legal career in Ōtautahi Christchurch and had a distinguished record from the Second World War. He was also an enthusiastic sportsman. Before the Second World War, Ewart Hay worked at the Land Transfer Office and after the war went into private practice, becoming a partner in the firm of Sir Ralph Thompson. Christine Brownlie, as Christine Apperley, was herself a student of Law at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury, graduating LLM in 1968. She became a lecturer in Te Kaupeka Ture | Faculty of Law and subsequently left to further her career overseas.
