1. Aronga | Purpose

This scholarship supports students from outside the Greater Christchurch area⁴ in their first year of study at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury while residing at a hall of residence recognised by the University.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

2.1 Applicants must be Year-13 students or on a gap year.³

2.2 Applicants, in the year of application (or, in the case of a gap year,³ in the previous year), must be attending a school and/or living outside the Greater Christchurch area.

2.3 Applicants must have achieved Merit at NCEA Level 2 or a corresponding level in an equivalent university entrance qualification.

2.4 Applicants must be eligible to receive StudyLink Student Allowance⁵ and recipients must be in receipt of a Student Allowance.

2.5 By the date advertised on the webpage for UC halls of residence, applicants must:

- a. complete the separate UC Application for Accommodation online form;⁶ and
- b. complete the New Zealand Common Confidential Reference Form.⁷

3. Tukanga tononga | Application process

Applications must be made online at the Scholarships website⁸ by 15 August.

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

4.1 Ninety scholarships are available annually. At least two are reserved for students who whakapapa Māori, at least two are reserved for students who identify as Pacific, at least two are reserved for students who identify as Rainbow, at least two are reserved for students who identify as disabled and at least two are reserved for students who will be registering with the University's Te Ratonga Whaikaha | Student Accessibility Service.

4.2 The scholarship is awarded by Te Kaunihera | University Council on the recommendation of a selection committee comprising:

- a. the Tumu Whakarae | Vice-Chancellor (or nominee);
- b. the Kaiwhakahaere Tartitari | Director of Recruitment (or nominee); and
- c. the Student Experience Manager (or nominee).

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

5.1 In making the recommendations, the selection committee gives consideration to:

- a. potential to benefit from a Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury education;
- b. commitment to creating positive change in the world;⁹
- c. engagement with the community that will benefit from the desired positive change in the world; and
- d. potential to benefit from the development opportunities offered by the scholarship shown in clause 6.1

Applicants are required to provide a confidential reference in support of these selection criteria.

5.2 If, in any year, there are fewer candidates of sufficient merit than there are scholarships available, fewer scholarships are offered.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

6.1 The scholarship provides assistance with fees for accommodation at a hall of residence recognised by the University¹, at a value of \$15,000, and priority consideration for a place at the hall². In addition, recipients receive the following:

- a. At no cost, the opportunity to participate in the Te Kakau a Māui Programme, a bespoke mentoring and development programme.
- b. At no cost, educational outdoor recreational field trips showcasing the UC campus and Ōtautahi Christchurch lifestyle in Waitaha Canterbury, organised by the University in the first year of study.
- c. At no cost, a range of workshops and seminars organised by the University for personal, academic, and professional development.

6.2 The value of the scholarship is deducted from the recipient's accommodation invoice on a pro-rata basis according to the hall's payment schedule.

- 6.3 The scholarship cannot be used to pay the accommodation application fee or the hall deposit. Payment will be made in January to align with the due date of the first instalments.
- 6.4 If the cost of accommodation fees is less than \$15,000 then the remaining funds will be paid by direct credit to the recipient's nominated New Zealand bank account after the final date in Semester 1 on which a student may receive a full refund for withdrawal from a course¹⁰.

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

- 7.1 The scholarship must be taken up in Semester One of the year following the year of application.
- 7.2 The scholarship is tenable during full-time enrolment in any undergraduate degree programme at the University.
- 7.3 The scholarship is tenable for one year.
- 7.4 The scholarship is not co-tenable with the following scholarships:
- Outstanding Impact Scholarship
 - UC Haupatu Scholarship
 - Empowerment Through Adversity Scholarship
 - UC Kaitoko Māori Scholarship
 - UC Kaitoko Pacific Scholarship
 - Te Kakau a Māui Scholarship
- It is co-tenable with any other award unless the conditions of the other award preclude this.
- 7.5 By accepting the award, recipients indicate that they are willing to engage in the opportunities detailed in clause 6.1:
- 7.6 The scholarship may be withdrawn, and any paid funds may be recovered if, during tenure, the recipient does not:
- maintain an enrolment that meets the conditions specified in clause 7.2;
 - maintain satisfactory academic engagement; and
 - adhere to the University's statutes, regulations, policies, and rules¹¹.

8. Whakamahuki | Background information

The University established the scholarship in 2020 to replace the Go Canterbury Scholarship, which the University and a previous accommodation partner had established in 2015. In 2024 the eligibility for the scholarship was extended to anyone not living or studying in Greater Christchurch immediately prior to coming to UC.
