General Waeture | Regulations

1. Aronga | Purpose

These scholarships support students for study towards a research doctoral degree¹ at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

2.1 Candidates must have been offered admission to a doctoral programme at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

2.2 Intending students who already hold a research doctoral degree¹ are not eligible for the scholarships.

3. Tukanga tononga | Application process

3.1 An application for admission to a doctoral programme is considered an application for these scholarships. No further application is necessary or possible, except in the following cases:

- a. A student currently enrolled in a master's programme who intends to transfer to a doctoral programme and wishes to be considered for the scholarships.²
- b. A student who was not offered a UC Doctoral Scholarship and wishes to be considered for the scholarship for a second time. Such applications may be made only on the basis of information that was unavailable at the time of first consideration, within six months of notification that the student will not be offered a scholarship. Only one application for such reconsideration is accepted.³

3.2 If, in any year, there are fewer candidates of sufficient merit for a scholarship than there are such scholarships available, fewer offers of that scholarship are made.

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

The scholarships are awarded by Te Kaunihera | University Council on the recommendation of the Amo Rangahau | Dean of Postgraduate Research (or nominee).

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

In making the recommendations, the Amo Rangahau | Dean of Postgraduate Research (or nominee) considers selection criteria specified for each scholarship in the appendices below, along with guidance from the Strategic Scholarships Advisory Committee.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

6.1 The values vary with the individual scholarship. See the appendices below for details.

6.2 For a part-time student the values of the instalments of the stipend payments, and the duration of a scholarship, are proportionate to the student's study workload.

6.3 A scholarship stipend is paid by direct credit to the recipient's nominated Aotearoa New Zealand bank account, in monthly instalments.

6.4 The first stipend payment is made as soon as practicable after the recipient has accepted a scholarship offer, completed enrolment in an applicable doctoral programme at the University, and begun study in the thesis component of such a programme.

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

- 7.1 The scholarships are tenable for the period necessary to complete up to 360 points of enrolment.⁴
- 7.2 Recipients should normally be enrolled in an applicable doctoral programme by the start date specified on their doctoral programme admission application. A recipient who is unable to enrol by that date must seek permission from the Amo Rangahau | Dean of Postgraduate Research to take up the applicable scholarship at a later date. Without this permission the offer of the award is rescinded.
- 7.3 Co-tenure conditions are as follows. (For a list of the UC Core, Recognition, and Prestige doctoral scholarships referred to in this clause, see <https://www.canterbury.ac.nz/get-started/scholarships/types/doctoral-scholarships>.)
- UC Core Doctoral Scholarships are not co-tenable with each other.
 - UC Core Doctoral Scholarships are co-tenable with Prestige Doctoral Scholarships.
 - Recognition Doctoral Scholarships are co-tenable with all other Recognition Doctoral Scholarships, and with all Core and Prestige doctoral scholarships.
 - Prestige Doctoral Scholarships are not co-tenable with other Prestige Doctoral Scholarships.
 - Core, Recognition, and Prestige doctoral scholarships are not co-tenable with any UC-funded stipendiary scholarship not in the list at <https://www.canterbury.ac.nz/get-started/scholarships/types/doctoral-scholarships>.
 - Co-tenure of a Core, Recognition, or Prestige doctoral scholarship with any scholarship not funded by UC is permitted only with the permission of the Amo Rangahau | Dean of Postgraduate Research. In granting such permission, the Amo | Dean may impose conditions.
- 7.4 If a recipient holds any other scholarship that pays tuition fees, that scholarship takes precedence in payment of the recipient's tuition fees.
- 7.5 Recipients must inform the Scholarship Office immediately if they suspend, complete, or otherwise cease their enrolment in an applicable doctoral programme.
- 7.6 If a recipient suspends enrolment in the applicable doctoral programme, a scholarship and associated payments are also suspended during this period. Suspension of the scholarship for longer than six months requires the approval of the Amo Rangahau | Dean of Postgraduate Research. If the recipient does not resume the programme of research within one month of the end of any approved suspension period, the scholarship is terminated.
- 7.7 If, during tenure, a recipient withdraws from the doctoral programme at the University that is applicable to the individual scholarship, the scholarship may be withdrawn, and any paid funds may be recovered.
- 7.8 Following thesis submission, any remaining stipend is paid, up until the examination process is complete.
- 7.9 A recipient, with the permission of the Amo Rangahau | Dean of Postgraduate Research, may retain their scholarship while enrolled as a distance student or while carrying out research for specified periods outside the University.
- 7.10 Continuation of a scholarship is conditional on satisfactory academic progress and adherence to the University's statutes, regulations, policies, and rules.

Appendix 1:

Specific regulations for the **UC Doctoral Scholarship**

1. Aronga | Purpose

This scholarship supports students for study towards a research doctoral degree⁵ at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

Candidates must have completed an appropriate qualification at a level judged to be equivalent to a bachelor's or master's degree with first-class honours at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury (equivalent to a UC GPA of at least 7.0).

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

The number of scholarships available varies annually.

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

In making the recommendations, the Amo Rangahau | Dean of Postgraduate Research (or nominee) considers the following, in descending order of priority:

- a. Academic achievement
- b. (1) The quality of the institution and programme pertaining to the candidate's qualifying degree(s), and (2) the candidate's prior relevant research experience, research publications, and other outputs, and (3) strategic objectives of the University

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

The scholarship provides financial assistance at a value of NZ\$28,000 per 120 points of thesis enrolment. In addition to the stipend, the scholarship covers tuition fees for thesis enrolment only, at the Aotearoa New Zealand domestic rate.⁶

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

The scholarship is tenable by full-time and part-time students engaged in study for a research doctoral degree⁵ at the University.

8. Whakamahuki | Background information

The University established the scholarship in 1993.

1. Aronga | Purpose

This scholarship recognises the single highest-ranked recipient of a UC Core Doctoral Scholarship⁷ at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

Candidates must have been offered a UC Core Doctoral Scholarship in the year of the award.

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

One scholarship is available annually.

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

The scholarship is offered to the candidate who is ranked highest amongst all those who have been offered a UC Core Doctoral Scholarship in the year of the award.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

The scholarship provides financial assistance at a value of NZ\$5,000 per 120 points of enrolment.

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

7.1 The scholarship is tenable by full-time and part-time students engaged in study for a research doctoral degree⁸ at the University.

7.2 If applicable, tenure of the Brownlie Scholarship is backdated to the commencement date of the co-tenured UC Core Doctoral Scholarship.

8. Whakamahuki | Background information

The scholarship was established in 1998 in recognition of the outstanding contribution to the development of Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury by Professor Albert Brownlie, Vice-Chancellor 1977–1998 and Head of Economics 1965–1977.

1. Aronga | Purpose

This scholarship recognises high-ranked domestic recipients of a UC Core Doctoral Scholarship at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

2.1 Candidates must be citizens of Aotearoa New Zealand or holders of Aotearoa New Zealand residence class visas.

2.2 Candidates, in the year of the award, must have been offered a UC Core Doctoral Scholarship after having completed an appropriate qualifying degree or other qualification at a level judged to be equivalent to a Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury GPA of at least 8.9.

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

The scholarship is offered to all students who meet the eligibility criteria specified in section 2.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

The scholarship confers recognition of exceptional achievement, but it provides no additional financial value beyond that of the co-tenured scholarship.

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

The scholarship is tenable by full-time and part-time students engaged in study for a research doctoral degree⁹ at the University.

8. Whakamahuki | Background information

The scholarship was established in 2001.

Appendix 4:

Specific regulations for the **Doctoral Graduate Women Canterbury (Inc.) Trust Board Scholarship**

1. Aronga | Purpose

This scholarship supports Aotearoa New Zealand women citizens for study towards a research doctoral degree¹⁰ in Te Kaupeka Toi Tangata | Faculty of Arts or in Te Kaupeka Ako | Faculty of Education or in Te Kaupeka Oranga | Faculty of Health at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

2.1 Candidates must identify as women.

2.2 Candidates must be citizens of Aotearoa New Zealand.

2.3 Candidates must have completed an appropriate qualification at a level judged to be equivalent to a bachelor's or master's degree with first-class honours at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury (equivalent to a UC GPA of at least 7.0).

2.4 Candidates must be intending to study in Te Kaupeka Toi Tangata | Faculty of Arts or in Te Kaupeka Ako | Faculty of Education or in Te Kaupeka Oranga | Faculty of Health at the University.

2.5 Candidates, in the year of the award, must have been considered for another UC Core Doctoral Scholarship.

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

One scholarship is available every three years.¹¹

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

In the years that the scholarship is available, it is offered to the first-ranked eligible candidate who was ranked highest amongst those considered in that year for the other UC Core Doctoral Scholarships without having subsequently been offered one of those scholarships.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

The scholarship provides financial assistance at a value of \$24,500 per 120 points of thesis enrolment. The recipient may elect to deduct her tuition fees from this amount.

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

7.1 The scholarship is tenable by full-time and part-time students engaged in study for a research doctoral degree¹² in Te Kaupeka Toi Tangata | Faculty of Arts or in Te Kaupeka Ako | Faculty of Education or in Te Kaupeka Oranga | Faculty of Health at the University.

7.2 By accepting the scholarship, recipients indicate that they are willing to be involved with publicity for Graduate Women Canterbury¹³ as appropriate.

1. Aronga | Purpose

This scholarship recognises the single highest-ranked recipient, among those with whakapapa Māori, of a UC Core Doctoral Scholarship at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

2.1 Candidates must have whakapapa Māori.

2.2 Candidates must have been offered a UC Core Doctoral Scholarship in the year of the award.

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

One scholarship is available annually.

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

The scholarship is offered to the eligible candidate who is ranked highest for the UC Core Doctoral Scholarships.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

The scholarship provides financial assistance at a value of NZ\$5,000 per 120 points of enrolment.

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

7.1 The scholarship is tenable by full-time and part-time students engaged in study for a research doctoral degree¹⁴ at the University.

7.2 If applicable, tenure of the Ngata Centenary Doctoral Scholarship is backdated to the commencement date of the co-tenured UC Core Doctoral Scholarship.

7.3 In the case of recipients who hold both the UC Matariki Doctoral Scholarship and the Ngata Centenary Doctoral Scholarship, the clauses continue to apply that relate to the enrolment in, or completion of, adjunct undergraduate courses, and to admission to the Tu Punenga programme (see appendix 8).

8. Whakamahuki | Background information

Appendix 6: Specific regulations for the **Rātā Foundation Scholarship**



1. Aronga | Purpose

The scholarship supports study towards a research doctoral degree¹⁵ at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha University of Canterbury by students from a funding region of the Rātā Foundation.¹⁶

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

2.3 Candidates must have a permanent address in one of the four funding regions of the Rātā Foundation.¹⁶

2.4 Candidates, in the year of the award, must have been considered for another UC Core Doctoral Scholarship.

4. Tukanga Kōwhiringa | Selection process

One scholarship is available every three years.¹⁷ The scholarship is available to candidates from the following faculties in rotation: (1) Toi Tangata | Arts, (2) Pūkaha | Engineering, (3) Pūtaiao | Science, (4) the remaining faculties together. In the event of there being no suitable candidate in the relevant faculty in a particular year of award, the scholarship is offered to a candidate in the next faculty in order of rotation.

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

The scholarship is offered to the eligible candidate in the year of the award who was ranked highest amongst those considered in that year for the other UC Core Doctoral Scholarships without having subsequently been offered one of those scholarships.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

The scholarship has a value of \$24,500 per 120 points of thesis enrolment. The recipient may elect to deduct their tuition fees from this amount.

1. Aronga | Purpose

This scholarship recognises and supports high-ranked students in a programme for a research doctoral degree²⁰ in Te Kaupeka Pūtaiao | Faculty of Science at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

Candidates must have been offered a UC Core Doctoral Scholarship in the year of the award for study in Te Kaupeka Pūtaiao | Faculty of Science at the University.

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

One scholarship is available annually.

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

The scholarship is offered to the single highest-ranked eligible candidate who has not been awarded another UC Prestige Doctoral Scholarship.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

The scholarship provides financial assistance at a value of NZ\$5,000 per 120 points of enrolment.²¹

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

7.1 The scholarship is tenable by full-time and part-time students engaged in study for a research doctoral degree²¹ in Te Kaupeka Pūtaiao | Faculty of Science at the University.

7.2 If applicable, tenure of the Roper Scholarship in Science is backdated to the commencement date of the co-tenured UC Core Doctoral Scholarship.

8. Whakamahuki | Background information

The scholarship was established in 1979 from a bequest of Edward William Roper (d. 4 October 1920).

Appendix 8:

Specific regulations for the **UC Matariki Doctoral Scholarship**

1. Aronga | Purpose

This scholarship supports ākonga Māori for study towards a research doctoral degree²² at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

Candidates must have whakapapa Māori.

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

4.1 Five scholarships are available annually and, in general, no more than one award is made to each of the University's academic divisions.²³

4.2 In addition to the Amo Rangahau | Dean of Postgraduate Research (or nominee), the selection committee for the UC Matariki Doctoral Scholarship comprises the following:

- a. the Kaihautū Matua Pākākano | Executive Director, Māori, Pacific, and Equity (or nominee); and
- b. the Kaihautū Kā Waimaero | Director of the Ngāi Tahu Research Centre (or nominee).

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

5.1 In making the recommendations, the selection committee considers, in descending order of priority:

- a. academic achievement;
- b. the candidate's prior relevant research experience, research publications, and other outputs; and
- b. endorsement from the Kaiārahi and/or Amo Matua | Executive Dean of the candidate's host academic unit.

5.2 If, in any year, fewer than five scholarships are offered, the value of an unallocated scholarship may be transferred to the UC Doctoral Scholarship pool.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

The scholarship provides financial assistance at a value of NZ\$28,000 per 120 points of thesis enrolment. In addition to the stipend, the scholarship covers tuition fees for thesis enrolment only, at the Aotearoa New Zealand domestic rate.²⁴

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

7.1 The scholarship is tenable by full-time and part-time students engaged in study for a research doctoral degree at the University.

7.2 Recipients are required to enrol in, or to have successfully completed, at least one of the following courses, with fees paid by the scholarship:

- a. HIST 292 / MAOR 285 *Oral Traditions and Modern Histories of Ngāi Tahu*;
- b. LAWS 326 *Treaty Settlement Negotiations*.

Unless alternative arrangements are approved by the Amo Rangahau | Dean of Postgraduate Research, enrolment in, and subsequent successful completion of,²⁵ one of those courses are required at the first opportunity at which the course is offered after taking up tenure of the scholarship.

7.3 Recipients are admitted to Te Punenga programme offered through Te Waka Pākākano | Office of Māori, Pacific, and Equity and the Māori Student Development Team.

7.4 Continuation of the scholarship is conditional on successful completion of a required course, as specified in clause 7.2.

7.5 In the case of recipients who also hold the Ngata Centenary Doctoral Scholarship, clauses 7.2, 7.3, and 7.4 of the regulations for the UC Matariki Doctoral Scholarship continue to apply.

Appendix 9: Specific regulations for the **UC Pacific/Pasifika Doctoral Scholarship**

1. Aronga | Purpose

This scholarship supports Pacific/Pasifika students²⁶ for study towards a research doctoral degree²⁷ at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

Candidates must be Pacific/Pasifika students.²⁷

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

4.1 Two scholarships are available annually, one of which is reserved for a candidate who has spent a substantial portion of their life in Aotearoa New Zealand, as evidenced by the candidate's CV.

4.2 In addition to the Amo Rangahau | Dean of Postgraduate Research (or nominee), the selection committee for the UC Pacific/Pasifika Doctoral Scholarship comprises the following:

- a. the Kaihautū | Director of Pasifika Development (or nominee); and
- b. the Kaihautū | Director of the Macmillan Brown Centre for Pacific Studies (or nominee).

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

5.1 In making the recommendations, the selection committee considers, in descending order of priority:

- a. academic achievement;
- b. the candidate's prior relevant research experience, research publications, and other outputs; and
- c. involvement in, and contribution to, Pacific/Pasifika communities in ways that demonstrate leadership skills.

5.2 If, in any year, there is no candidate of sufficient merit who has spent a substantial portion of their life in Aotearoa New Zealand (see clause 4.1), the scholarship reserved for such candidates is made available to the other candidates. The value of any unawarded scholarship is transferred to enable an additional UC Doctoral Scholarship to be offered.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

The scholarship provides financial assistance at a value of NZ\$28,000 per 120 points of thesis enrolment. In addition to the stipend, the scholarships cover tuition fees for thesis enrolment only, at the Aotearoa New Zealand domestic rate.²⁸

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

The scholarship is tenable by full-time and part-time students engaged in study for a research doctoral degree²⁸ at the University.

8. Whakamahuki | Background information

The University established the scholarship in 2021, to replace the UC Pasifika Doctoral Scholarship, which it had established in 2015.

Specific regulations for the **William and Ina Cartwright Scholarship**

1. Aronga | Purpose

This scholarship supports students for study towards a research doctoral degree²⁹ at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

2.1 Candidates must have completed an appropriate qualification at a level judged to be equivalent to a bachelor's or master's degree with first-class honours at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury (equivalent to a UC GPA of at least 7.0).

2.2 Candidates must be intending to study the discipline of Education at the University.

2.3 Candidates, in the year of the award, must have been considered for another UC Core Doctoral Scholarship.

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

Normally, one scholarship is available annually.

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

5.1 The scholarship is offered to the highest-ranked eligible candidate (or candidates; see clause 5.2) who has not been offered another UC Prestige Doctoral Scholarship.

5.2 The value of an unawarded scholarship may be made available in the following year for an additional scholarship.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

The scholarship provides financial assistance at a value of NZ\$5,000 per 120 points of enrolment.³⁰

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

7.1 The scholarship is tenable by students engaged in study for a research doctoral degree³⁰ in the discipline of Education.

7.2 If applicable, tenure of the William and Ina Cartwright Scholarship is backdated to the commencement date of the co-tenured UC Core Doctoral Scholarship.

8. Whakamahuki | Background information

The scholarship was established in 1982 from funds provided by the income from a bequest made by Christina Nairn Cartwright (d. 12 April 1981). In 2015 the scholarship was restructured to allow the bequest to supplement a University of Canterbury Doctoral Scholarship under the name of this award.
